Safety & Child Supervision:

This guide contains descriptions of outdoor structural construction (building a Sukkah), live candle lighting ceremonies, and children's crafts involving small pieces, scissors, or water.

- **Adult Supervision Required:** All building projects, knife handling during food preparation, and craft activities must be strictly supervised by an adult at all times.
- **Fire Safety:** Never leave burning festival candles or outdoor lanterns unattended. Ensure candles are placed in heavy glass shields on a stable, heat-resistant surface away from wind, flammable decorations, or children's reach.
- **Sukkah Safety:** Ensure any temporary canopy or wooden frame built outdoors is structurally secure, safely anchored against gusts of wind, and that overhead foliage is lightweight and securely attached.

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2. YOM TERUAH / THE FEAST OF TRUMPETS

Prophetic Theme: The Awakening Blast, the Gathering of the Saints, and the Coronation of the King.

What is Yom Teruah?

- Established in Leviticus 23:24, it is a sacred day of rest commemorated with the **blowing of the shofar** (a trumpet made from a ram's horn).
- **The Purpose:** It serves as a spiritual wake-up call, signaling the start of a ten-day period of self-reflection and repentance leading up to Yom Kippur (the Day of Atonement).

Christian Context

- Many Christians refer to it as the **Feast of Trumpets**.
 - It holds prophetic significance as a symbol of the **return of Christ** and the final resurrection, which the New Testament frequently associates with the sounding of a trumpet (1 Thessalonians 4:16).

KJV Scripture Focus

"Speak unto the children of Israel, saying, In the seventh month, in the first day of the month, shall ye have a sabbath, a memorial of blowing of trumpets, an holy convocation." — **Leviticus 23:24**

"For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord." — **1 Thessalonians 4:16-17**

Decoration Ideas

- **The Theme:** Gold, silver, and trumpet symbols. Bright, celebratory colors representing royalty and the sky.
- **Decorations:** White tablecloth, gold plates or chargers, small decorative horns or trumpets as centerpieces, and scattered table confetti shaped like musical notes or trumpets.

Sample Menu Plan:

- Round challah bread (symbolizing a crown for the King)
- Honey and sliced apples (praying for a sweet season ahead under God's provision)
- Pomegranate seeds (remembering God's abundant blessings)
- Roasted chicken with rosemary and honey-glazed carrots
- Apple crisp or honey cake for dessert

SECTION 1: MASTER PLANNING & TIMELINE CHECKLIST

THE 1-WEEK COUNTDOWN CHECKLIST

- **Shofar/Horn Procurement:** Ensure you have a physical shofar, trumpet, or decorative horn ready to be blown by the family leader or children.
- **Table Settings:** Gather bright, celebratory decorations including a white linen tablecloth, gold or silver plates/chargers, and trumpet-shaped centerpieces or musical note confetti.
- **Sweet Season Elements:** Purchase fresh, crisp autumn apples and organic raw honey to represent the sweetness of God's kingdom and provision.
- **Main Feast Ingredients:** Secure a round baking pan (for the crown challah bread), a roasting chicken, fresh rosemary, honey, carrots, and a fresh pomegranate.

YOM TERUAH DAILY ITINERARY

Print this schedule to keep your household organized and peaceful on the day of the feast.

- **2:00 PM – Feast Prep & Kitchen Hour**
Begin roasting the Honey-Rosemary Chicken, chop the vegetables, and place the pre-coiled Crown Challah in the oven so the sweet aroma fills your home.
- **3:30 PM – Children's Craft Station**
Gather the kids at the table to build their *Trumpets of Royalty* cardstock horns so they are fully prepared for the twilight assembly.
- **4:30 PM – Table Setup & Decoration**
Lay the white linen tablecloth. Set out the gold or silver chargers, place the fresh apples and raw honey in the center, and set up the white candles in their glass shields.
- **5:30 PM – Clean Up & Dress in White**
Have everyone pause, tidy the house, and dress in clean or white festive attire to visually signify readiness for the King.
- **6:15 PM – Twilight Assembly (The Feast Begins)**
Gather the family around the prepared table as the sun begins to set.
- **6:20 PM – Step 1: Feast Lighting Script**
The mother or hostess kindles the candles and reads the opening proclamation and Luke 12 script.
- **6:30 PM – Step 2: Sounding of the Shofar**
The family leader sounds the physical blasts (*Tekiah, Teruah, Tekiah Gedolah*) while the children raise their craft horns.
- **6:40 PM – Step 3 & 4: Welcome & Awakening Prayer**
Read the 1 Thessalonians focus scripture and pray the Awakening Prayer together as a family.
- **6:50 PM – Step 5: Apples & Honey Blessing**
Dip the fresh autumn apples into the raw honey, recite Psalm 119:103, and share them around the table.
- **7:00 PM – The Coronation Harvest Feast**
Serve the main dinner meal together with joy, praise, and family fellowship.

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STEP 1: THE FEAST LIGHTING SCRIPT

The mother or hostess strikes a match and kindles two white candles inside glass hurricane shields on the table, gesturing with her hands to bring the light inward.

- **The Proclamation:** "As we light these candles to begin the Feast of Trumpets, we remember that we are commanded to watch and pray. Let these flames remind us to keep our lamps full of oil, waiting expectantly for the glorious appearance of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ, who is the true Light of the World."
- **The Scripture Recitation:**

"Let your loins be girded about, and your lights burning; And ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding; that when he cometh and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately." — Luke 12:35-36

- **The Blessing Prayer:** "Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who hast given us life, sustained us, and brought us to this holy convocation. Sanctify our home tonight by Thy presence, and grant that our lights may always burn bright for Thee. In Jesus' name, Amen."

STEP 2: THE SOUNDING OF THE SHOFAR

The leader or a designated family member lifts the shofar or trumpet and sounds three distinct blasts to symbolize the Awakening, the Gathering, and the Shout of Victory.

- **The Proclamation:** "The sound of the trumpet is God's alarm clock for the soul! Historically, it called Israel to halt their labor, gather together, and prepare for judgment and the arrival of the King. Prophetically, we blow the trumpet tonight because we are listening for that final, heavenly trumpet blast that will gather the saints from the four corners of the earth!"
- **The Scripture Recitation:**

"Behold, I shew you a mystery; We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed." — 1 Corinthians 15:51-52

- **The Action:** Sound one long, piercing blast (*Tekiah*), followed by a series of short, broken staccato notes (*Teruah*), and finish with one final, sustained, maximum-length blast (*Tekiah Gedolah*). You may also play a recording, if needed.

STEP 3: THE HOST WELCOME & LITURGY

The family leader stands at the head of the dinner table to welcome the family and guests.

- **The Host Script:** "Welcome, family and friends, to Yom Teruah, the Feast of Trumpets! Tonight marks the beginning of the fall appointments of the Lord. While the spring feasts were fulfilled precisely to the day by Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection, the fall feasts point forward to His glorious return. The trumpet has sounded tonight to shake us out of spiritual slumber. Let us examine our hearts, rejoice in our salvation, and live every day as if the King is at the very door."
- **The KJV Scripture Focus:**

"For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord. Wherefore comfort one another with these words." — 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18

STEP 4: THE AWAKENING PRAYER

The whole family bows their heads together.

- **The Prayer:** "Almighty God, Lord of the heavenly hosts, we praise Thee tonight with joyful hearts! Thank Thee for the warning and the promise of the trumpet blast. Wake us up, Lord, from any spiritual laziness, complacency, or worldly distractions. Keep our garments white and our hearts pure. We look forward with unmatched anticipation to that great day when the clouds shall roll back and the last trump shall sound. Until then, protect our family, fill us with Thy Holy Spirit, and help us to be faithful watchmen on the wall. In the precious name of Jesus Christ, Amen."

STEP 5: THE APPLES, HONEY, & HARVEST FEAST

The Apples & Honey Blessing Tradition

Before passing the main courses, the leader takes a slice of fresh apple, dips it deeply into the raw honey, and holds it up.

- **The Meaning:** The round challah bread we eat tonight represents a crown, celebrating Jesus as our reigning King. The apples and honey are a physical prayer asking God to bless our family with spiritual sweetness, joy, and fruitfulness under His sovereign rule in the days ahead.
- **The Scripture Recitation:**

"How sweet are thy words unto my taste! yea, sweeter than honey to my mouth!"

— Psalm 119:103

- **The Action:** The leader takes a bite, then passes the plate of apples and a bowl of honey around the table so every family member and guest can dip and eat together.

Children's Activities

Craft: The Trumpets of Royalty

- **Activity:** Give children sheets of heavy gold or silver metallic cardstock. Help them roll the paper diagonally into a cone shape to create a classic royal herald trumpet, securing the seam with heavy-duty tape. Let them decorate their trumpets with jewel stickers, glitter glue, and red ribbons tied to the stem. During Step 2 of the timeline, allow them to lift their homemade trumpets and mimic the sound of the shofar!

Game: "Watchman, What of the Night?"

- **Activity:** One child is the watchman and closes their eyes. The leader hides a small plastic trumpet in the room. The child opens their eyes and must find the trumpet based on the family clapping faster or louder as they get closer.

Yom Teruah Harvest Menu & Recipes

Royal Crown Challah Bread

Ingredients:

- 4 cups all-purpose flour,
- 1 packet instant yeast,
- 1/3 cup honey,
- 1 tsp salt,
- 3 large eggs (plus 1 for egg wash),
- 1/2 cup warm water,
- 1/4 cup olive oil.

Instructions:

Whisk yeast, warm water, and 1 tbsp of the honey together; let sit 5 minutes until frothy. In a large bowl, mix flour and salt. Pour in the yeast mixture, remaining honey, eggs, and olive oil. Knead for 8 to 10 minutes until a smooth dough forms. Place in an oiled bowl, cover, and let rise for 1.5 hours. Punch down, roll the dough into one long, continuous strand, and coil it tightly into a circle inside a round cake pan to resemble a royal crown. Let rise 30 minutes. Brush with a beaten egg wash and bake at 350°F for 25 to 30 minutes until deep golden brown.

Honey-Rosemary Coronation Chicken

Ingredients:

- 1 whole roasting chicken (or 6 bone-in chicken breasts),
- 1/2 cup raw honey,
- 4 tbsp melted butter,
- 3 tbsp fresh rosemary (finely chopped),
- 4 large garlic cloves (minced),
- 1 lb baby carrots,
- Spices: salt, black pepper.

Instructions:

Pat the chicken completely dry and place it in a large roasting pan surrounded by the baby carrots. Season the chicken and carrots generously with salt and pepper. In a small bowl, whisk together the melted butter, raw honey, minced garlic, and chopped rosemary. Pour two-thirds of this golden glaze entirely over the chicken, rubbing it into the skin. Roast uncovered at 370°F for 1 hour to 1 hour and 15 minutes (until internal temperature reaches 165°F), brushing the remaining glaze over the top during the last 15 minutes of baking for a rich, sweet, brown crust.

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YOM KIPPUR: THE DAY OF ATONEMENT

A Solemn Guide for Family Reflection, Fasting, and Intercession (KJV)



“Neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us.” — Hebrews 9:12

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3. YOM KIPPUR / THE DAY OF ATONEMENT

Prophetic Theme: The Day of Judgment, Cleansing, the Blood of the Lamb, and Intercession.

What is Yom Kippur?

Yom Kippur (literally "Day of Atonement") is the holiest, most solemn day of the biblical calendar. It takes place ten days after Yom Teruah (the Feast of Trumpets) and just five days before Sukkot.

Core Meaning

- **The Commandment:** Established in Leviticus 23:27, it is a day of complete rest, self-examination, and fasting ("afflicting your soul").
 - **The Purpose:** In biblical times, it was the one day a year the High Priest entered the Holy of Holies to make blood sacrifices, cleansing the Tabernacle and obtaining forgiveness for Israel's sins.

KJV Scripture Focus

"Also on the tenth day of this seventh month there shall be a day of atonement: it shall be an holy convocation unto you; and ye shall afflict your souls, and offer an offering made by fire unto the LORD." — **Leviticus 23:27**

"But Christ being come an high priest of good things to come... Neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us." — **Hebrews 9:11-12**

The Use of White (The Main "Visual" Theme)

Instead of hanging decorations, the visual focus of Yom Kippur is the color white, which symbolizes purity, cleansing from sin (Isaiah 1:18), and equality before God.

- **Clothing:** It is traditional for everyone to wear white clothing to services or family prayer.
- **Linens:** Families often use a simple, plain white tablecloth for the *Pre-Fast Meal* (Erev Yom Kippur) and the *Break-Fast Meal* the following night.

Yahrzeit (Memorial) and Holiday Candles

- Before the fast begins at sundown, it is traditional to light a 24-hour memorial candle (Yahrzeit candle) in memory of loved ones who have passed away, alongside the standard holiday candles. These burn quietly in the home throughout the day.

Menu Plan (Pre- and Post-Fast)

- **Meal Before the Fast (Erev Yom Kippur):** Easy-to-digest, hydrating foods with low sodium to make fasting easier.
 - Large bowl of chicken vegetable noodle soup
 - Plain baked chicken breasts and brown rice
 - Water, herbal teas, and fresh watermelon slices
 - **Break-the-Fast Menu:** Light, comforting foods to reintroduce to the stomach.
 - Fresh fruit platter (grapes, melons, berries)
 - Quiche or egg bake with spinach and cheese
 - Soft rolls with butter
 - Mild vegetable broth
-

Reflection Guide & Family Prayers

- **The Atmosphere:** A solemn, deeply reverent, and reflective atmosphere. The day is spent in prayer, fasting (for adults and older children as appropriate), scripture reading, and resting from labor.
- **Opening Prayer (Starting the Fast):** "Almighty God, as we enter into this Day of Atonement, we humble our souls before Thee. We acknowledge our sins, and we thank Thee from the depths of our hearts for the perfect sacrifice of Thy Son, Jesus Christ, whose blood cleanseth us from all unrighteousness. As we fast today, let our hearts be fixed on Thy mercy, Thy holiness, and the great price paid for our redemption. Amen."
- **Family Discussion Prompt:** Read Isaiah 53 together. Discuss how Jesus perfectly fulfilled the role of both the sacrificial goat and the scapegoat, carrying our sins far away from us.

Preparing Your Home Space

If you are observing the day at home with family and friends, you can prepare the physical environment to reflect the solemnity of the day:

- **Clear Away Distractions:** Tidy up the main room, put away everyday clutter, and turn off televisions or music.
- **Prayer Visuals:** Set out Bibles, journals, or prayer books on a clean table.
- **Comfortable Seating:** Since it is a day of resting and praying, ensure there is a quiet, comfortable space for family members to read and reflect while fasting.

- **Fasting Preparation:** Discuss fasting constraints with the family. Determine age-appropriate participation (e.g., adults and teens fasting from food/water, while young children fast from treats or screens). -See *additional notes on fasting*
- **Pure White Attire:** Ensure every family member has clean, pure white clothing prepared to wear on this day, visually symbolizing being washed clean by the blood of Christ.
- **Pre-Fast Hydration Prep:** Stock up on low-sodium broth, watermelon, herbal teas, and high-protein foods to build a nourishing, hydrating pre-fast meal.
- **Break-the-Fast Groceries:** Purchase easy-to-digest items like eggs (for quiche), fresh fruits (grapes, melons), and mild vegetable broth to gently reintroduce food to the stomach.
- **Object Lesson Materials:** Secure water-soluble paper (or standard white tissue paper), a large clear glass bowl, and white cotton balls or white felt.

YOM KIPPUR DAILY ITINERARY

Print this schedule to guide your family smoothly through this solemn sabbath rest.

- **3:30 PM – Pre-Fast Kitchen Prep**
Prepare the hydrating chicken soup and unseasoned baked chicken.
Simultaneously, assemble the break-the-fast quiche so it is ready to bake instantly the following evening.
- **4:30 PM – The Erev Yom Kippur Meal (Pre-Fast)**
Sit down as a family to eat a nourishing, low-sodium meal. Encourage everyone to drink plenty of water and herbal teas.
- **5:30 PM – Dress in Pure White & Tidy up**
Wash the dinner dishes quickly. Have every family member change into clean, pure white clothing to signify a state of holiness and readiness before God.
- **6:15 PM – Step 1: Solemn Candle Lighting**
Gather around the table as twilight approaches. The mother or hostess kindles the candles in absolute silence before reading the proclamation.
- **6:25 PM – Step 2: Opening Repentance Prayer**
The family leader reads the Isaiah and Hebrews passages, leading the family into a focused time of quiet reflection and prayer.
- **6:45 PM – Step 3: Children's Object Lesson**
Conduct the water-soluble paper activity to give children a powerful visual demonstration of how completely Christ removes our sins.
- **7:15 PM – Holy Scripture Reading & Quiet Rest**
Read through Isaiah 53 and portions of the book of Hebrews together. Transition into a quiet evening of prayer, scripture journaling, and rest from all labor.
- **NEXT DAY (All Day) – The Day of Affliction & Prayer**
Spend the day in rest, prayer, and fasting. Walk gently outside, read scriptures, and avoid any secular distractions or work.
- **6:30 PM (Next Day) – The High Priest Blessing**
As sundown arrives to mark the end of the 25-hour fast, pronounce Aaron's blessing over the children and celebrate our complete redemption in Christ.
- **6:45 PM (Next Day) – Greet the Harvest: Break-the-Fast**
Serve the light, comforting fruit platter and egg bake. Drink water and celebrate with immense gratitude!

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STEP 1: THE SOLEMN CANDLE LIGHTING SCRIPT

The mother or hostess strikes a match and kindles two white candles inside glass shields on the table.

- **The Proclamation:** "We kindle these lights as we enter the most solemn day of the year: the Day of Atonement. In ancient times, this was the one day the High Priest could pass through the thick veil into the Holy of Holies with the blood of a spotless sacrifice. Tonight, we do not light these candles in fear of judgment, but in awe of the cross, knowing the veil has been rent in twain."

- **The Scripture Recitation:**

"Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the holiest by the blood of Jesus, By a new and living way, which he hath consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say, his flesh; And having an high priest over the house of God; Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith..." — Hebrews 10:19-22

- **The Prayer:** "Almighty God, Judge of all the earth, we humble our souls before Thee tonight as we begin this solemn fast. Wash us, cleanse us, and search our hearts. We rest completely in the finished work of Jesus, our Great High Priest. Let Thy peace rest upon this home. Amen."

STEP 2: THE REPENTANCE LITURGY & SCAPEGOAT PROCLAMATION

The family leader stands to lead a time of deep family confession and gratitude.

- **The Leader Script:** "Yom Kippur is a day to afflict our souls through fasting, reminding us that we cannot save ourselves. In the Old Covenant, two goats were chosen: one was sacrificed for the people's sins, and the other—the scapegoat—had the sins of Israel confessed over its head before being led away into the wilderness, never to be seen again. Jesus fulfilled both roles perfectly. He shed His blood to pay our penalty, and He carried our sins infinitely far away from us."

- **The KJV Scripture Focus:**

"Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." — Isaiah 53:4-6

- **The Nightly Family Prayer:** "Lord God Almighty, we confess that we have sinned against Thee in thought, word, and deed. We thank Thee from the depths of our souls that Thou hast laid all of our iniquities upon Jesus. Thank Thee that His blood cleanseth us from all unrighteousness. We lay aside our pride, our self-reliance, and our worldly desires today. Keep us clothed in Thy pure righteousness. In Jesus' holy name, Amen."
-

STEP 3: THE "CAST AWAY" CHILDREN'S COVENANT SCRIPT

To be performed directly after the Repentance Prayer. Place the large clear glass bowl filled with warm water in the center of the table and hand the children their written water-soluble or tissue papers.

- **The Leader Proclamation:** "Children, look closely at this bowl of clear water. The Bible tells us that our sins make us heavy and separate us from God. But when we repent and trust in the blood of Jesus, God doesn't just hide our mistakes—He completely destroys them. He casts them into the deepest sea."
- **The Scripture Recitation** (Have the children read or repeat):

"He will turn again, he will have compassion upon us; he will subdue our iniquities; and thou wilt cast all their sins into the depths of the sea." — Micah 7:19

- **The Action:** Have each child carefully drop their paper into the water bowl. Let everyone watch in silence as the ink and paper dissolve and break apart completely into nothingness. (***Explain to them that because of Jesus, their mistakes are dissolved completely and remembered no more.)***
- **The Closing Object Lesson Prayer:** "Dear Heavenly Father, we thank Thee for this beautiful picture of Thy grace. Just as this paper has dissolved and vanished from our sight, we thank Thee that through the sacrifice of Jesus, our sins are washed away completely. Thank Thee for having compassion on our family. Amen."

Children's Activities

Activity: The "Cast Away" Object Lesson

- *Activity:* Children write down words or draw pictures of things like "selfishness," "disobedience," or "lying" on water-soluble paper or small dissolvable labels. Together, place them into a large bowl of water and watch them dissolve completely, showing how God washes away our sins and remembers them no more (Hebrews 8:12).

THESE WILL BE USED DURING STEP 3!

Craft: Clothed in White Garments

- *Activity:* Cut out paper doll figures and have children design simple, pure white clothes for them using white felt, cotton balls, or white lace, symbolizing being clothed in the righteousness of Christ (Revelation 19:8).
-

STEP 4: Holy Scripture Reading & Quiet Rest

Read through Isaiah 53 and portions of the book of Hebrews together. Transition into a quiet evening of prayer, scripture journaling, and rest from all labor.

STEP 5: THE BREAKING OF THE FAST LITURGY

To be read aloud at sundown to officially close Yom Kippur.

THE CLOSING LITURGY

The Action:

Gather the family around the dinner table where the fresh fruits, water, and warm quiche are set out. Do not eat or drink yet. The family leader stands and sounds one final, long, triumphant blast on the Shofar to announce the end of the fast.

The Host Script (Read aloud):

"Family, hear the sound of the trumpet! The Day of Atonement is finished. The fast is over, and our souls are completely cleansed. We have afflicted our flesh to remind ourselves that we cannot save ourselves.

Tonight, we stand in pure white garments, fully redeemed. The thick veil of the Temple has been rent in twain. We no longer look at God through a curtain of fear; we look at Him through the blood of Jesus Christ, who has carried our sins away forever. It is time to step out of solemn reflection and step into the pure joy of the harvest!"

The KJV Scripture Recitation:

"Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits: Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases; Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies... As far as the east is from the west, so far hath he removed our transgressions from us." — Psalm 103:2-4, 12

The High Priest Blessing Over the Children:

(The father or leader places his hands on the children's heads and pronounces the Aaronic blessing)

"The LORD bless thee, and keep thee: The LORD make his face shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee: The LORD lift up his countenance upon thee, and give thee peace. Amen."

The Action:

Pour the cups of water. The leader takes the first bite of fruit and passes the platter, officially breaking the fast with joy!

THE TRANSITION TO SUKKOT

Read this brief prompt immediately after the meal is cleared to prepare the family for the next phase.

The Host Script:

"Now that our hearts are clean, our next appointment with the Lord is only five days away! The Bible tells us that after we are forgiven, we are called to rejoice. Let us go outside together tonight and lay the very first foundation frame of our Sukkah. As we drive this stake into the ground, we declare that our home is ready to tabernacle with the King!"

SECTION 4: THE PRE-FAST & BREAK-FAST FEAST COOKBOOK

The Hydrating Pre-Fast Menu (Low-Sodium)

Eat this meal 1 to 2 hours before the fast begins to stabilize blood sugar and optimize hydration.

Clear Wilderness Chicken Vegetable Soup

Ingredients:

- 1 lb chicken breast,
- 4 cups low-sodium chicken broth,
- 2 cups water, 3 carrots (sliced),
- 2 stalks celery (chopped),
- 1 zucchini (sliced),
- Spices: 1 tsp parsley, 1/2 tsp ginger powder (helps settle the stomach).

Instructions:

Bring chicken broth and water to a boil in a large pot. Add the chicken breast and simmer for 15 minutes until fully cooked; remove, shred with two forks, and return to the pot. Stir in the sliced carrots, celery, zucchini, parsley, and ginger powder. Reduce heat to low, cover, and simmer for 25 minutes until the vegetables are perfectly soft. Serve warm in large bowls alongside fresh watermelon slices for maximum hydration.

The Gentle Break-the-Fast Menu

Serve this light, comforting meal immediately when the fast ends at sundown the following day.

The Righteousness of Christ Spinach Quiche

Ingredients:

- 1 pre-made pie crust,
- 6 large eggs,
- 1/2 cup milk,
- 1 cup fresh spinach (chopped),
- 1 cup shredded Swiss or cheddar cheese,
- 1/2 onion (finely diced),
- Spices: 1/2 tsp salt, 1/4 tsp pepper.

Instructions:

Sauté the diced onion and chopped spinach in a pan until completely wilted; let cool slightly. In a medium bowl, whisk the eggs, milk, salt, and pepper together until smooth. Layer the spinach, onions, and shredded cheese evenly across the bottom of the pie crust. Pour the egg mixture completely over the top. Bake at 375°F for 35 to 40 minutes until the center is completely set and the top layer turns a beautiful light golden brown. Serve in small slices alongside a platter of fresh green grapes and cold melon wedges.

APPENDIX: HOLY CONVOCATION ALTERNATIVE FASTING GUIDE

A Biblical Approach to Afflicting the Soul for Children, Expectant Mothers, and Those with Health Constraints

While a complete food and water fast is traditional for adults on Yom Kippur, the underlying biblical command in Leviticus 23:27 is to "afflict your souls." True scriptural affliction is not about legalistic physical starvation, but about humbling our hearts, denying our fleshly desires, and removing distractions to fix our gaze entirely on Jesus Christ.

If age, health conditions, or personal medical constraints prevent you from doing a complete food fast, this guide offers four high-utility biblical alternatives to fully participate in the solemnity of the day without compromising your physical well-being.

1. THE DANIEL FAST (THE PLAIN DIET)

- **The Scripture Focus:** *"In those days I Daniel was mourning three full weeks. I ate no pleasant bread, neither came flesh nor wine in my mouth, neither did I anoint myself at all..." — Daniel 10:2-3*
- **The Practical Action:** Abstain entirely from "pleasant foods." This means cutting out sweets, baked treats, rich meats, heavily seasoned dishes, juices, and caffeine.
- **How it Afflicts the Soul:** You consume only what your body fundamentally *needs* to stay healthy—such as plain water, simple vegetables, oatmeal, or plain unseasoned chicken—removing the fleshly pleasure of taste so your satisfaction comes only from the Word of God.

2. THE TOTAL DIGITAL & MEDIA FAST

- **The Scripture Focus:** *"Turn away mine eyes from beholding vanity; and quicken thou me in thy way." — Psalm 119:37*
- **The Practical Action:** Power down every screen in the household for the entire 25 hours. This includes smartphones, televisions, tablets, laptops, video games, and secular music.
- **How it Afflicts the Soul:** In our modern world, entertainment and digital noise are the primary ways we distract our souls from reflecting on our spiritual condition. Silencing the noise forces a deep, quiet self-examination and opens up hours of uninterrupted time for prayer and scripture journaling.

3. THE LABORS OF COMFORT FAST (THE PILGRIM WALK)

- **The Scripture Focus:** *"Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others. Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus..." — Philippians 2:4-5*
- **The Practical Action:** Deny yourself modern physical luxuries. Fast from using soft couches, warm lounging blankets, hot luxurious showers, or sleeping with your favorite pillows.
- **How it Afflicts the Soul:** By intentionally making your physical surroundings modest and simple for one day, you identify with the wandering, fragile state of our earthly tent. It serves as a physical reminder that our true comfort is found only under the wings of the Lord.

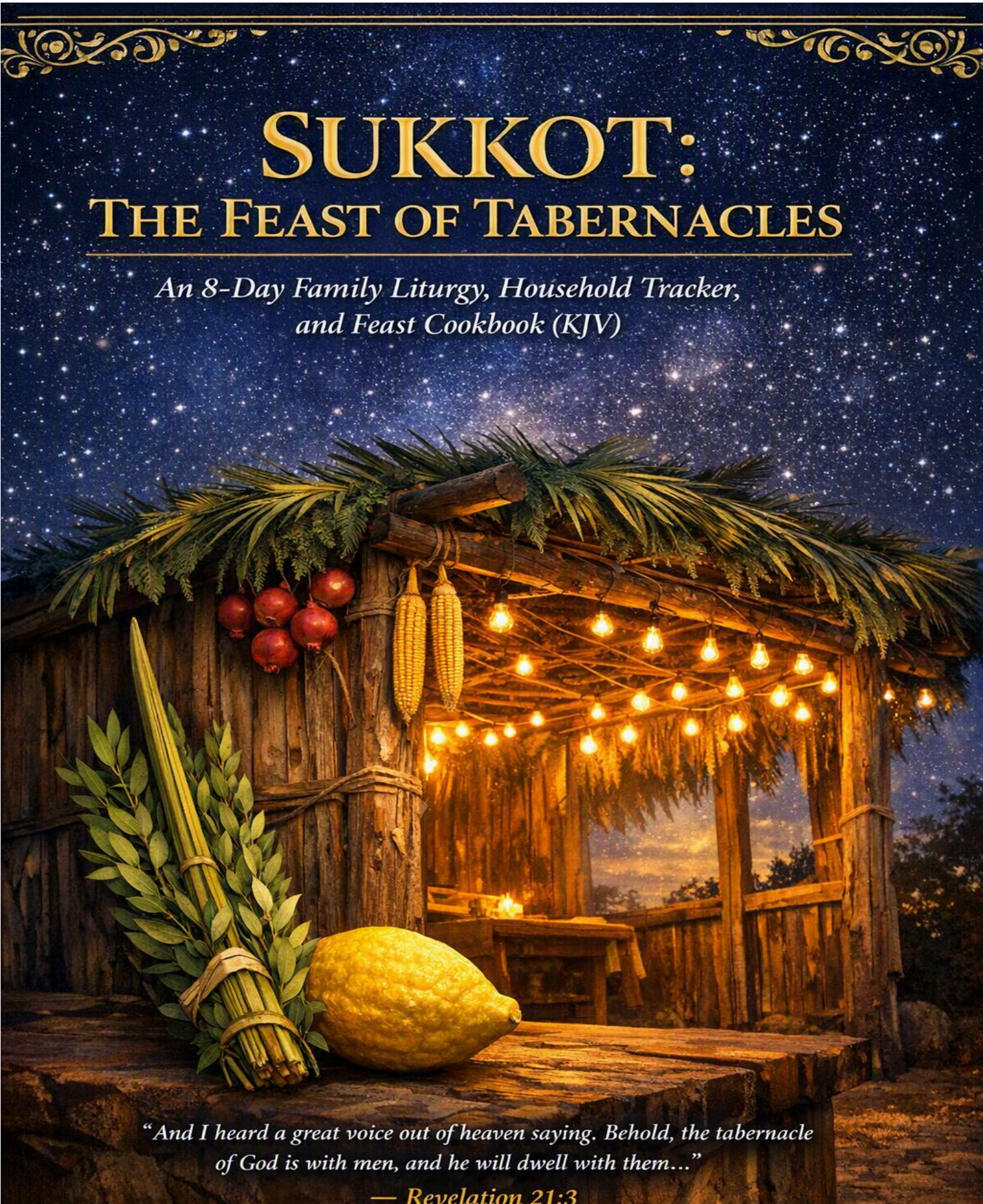
4. THE FAST OF WORDS (THE SILENT HOUR)

- **The Scripture Focus:** *"Let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath... If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain." — James 1:19, 26*
- **The Practical Action:** Set aside a 3-hour or 6-hour block during the day of Yom Kippur for total, absolute family silence. No speaking, whispering, or verbal communication is permitted unless it is reading scripture aloud together.
- **How it Afflicts the Soul:** Bridling the tongue is one of the hardest disciplines for the human flesh. Choosing absolute silence curbs the urge to complain, gossip, or speak idly, turning your internal thoughts into a continuous, quiet prayer before the throne of God.

SPECIAL TRACKER: HOW TO SUBSTITUTE THESE INTO YOUR ITINERARY

When your family reaches the Day of Affliction & Prayer on your Yom Kippur schedule:

- Instead of spending the afternoon managing hunger, use the hours normally spent on cooking or digital entertainment to gather the family and read **Isaiah 58** aloud, discussing what a true fast looks like in the eyes of God.

Sukkah Building, Decoration Ideas & Menu Plans

- **The Sukkah (Tabernacle):** A temporary outdoor structure with a roof made of natural materials (palm fronds, pine branches, corn stalks) through which you can see the stars. It can be built using a simple PVC pipe frame, an easy-to-assemble pop-up canopy frame with the canvas top removed, or a wooden frame.
 - **Decoration Ideas:**
 - Hanging string lights or solar-powered lanterns for evening meals.
 - Paper chains, drawings of biblical scenes, and natural foliage.
 - Printable or real fruit and vegetable hangings (corn, gourds, citrus, pomegranates).
 - **Master Menu Concept:** Celebrate with rich, abundant foods. Stuffed foods (like stuffed peppers or cabbage) are traditional to symbolize an overflowing, packed harvest. Serve hearty grilled meats, roasted root vegetables, warm apple cider, and fresh fruit cobblers.

What is Sukkot?

"It is one of the three major biblical feasts established by God in Leviticus. It is a harvest festival also known as the Feast of Tabernacles. For Christians, it's a beautiful picture of Jesus coming to 'tabernacle' or dwell among us, and it reminds us to thank God for His daily provision and spiritual shelter."

Physical Guests (Radical Hospitality)

Beyond the symbolic biblical figures, families traditionally try to host physical guests—such as church friends, extended family, or neighbors—for as many nights of the festival as possible.

Because the traditional Sukkah has an open door and a see-through roof, it is a visual reminder to practice biblical hospitality:

SECTION 1: MASTER PLANNING & TIMELINE CHECKLISTS

THE 3-WEEK COUNTDOWN CHECKLIST

- **Sukkah Infrastructure:** Source your temporary outdoor structure materials. (Popular home choices include a 10x10 canopy frame with the top fabric removed, a custom PVC pipe frame, or standard wooden 2x4 beams).
- **Sukkah Roof Materials:** Source your natural organic covering (*S'chach*). Gather pine boughs, palm fronds, or thick corn stalks from your yard or local nurseries.
- **The Four Species:** Order or gather a Palm frond (*Lulav*), Myrtle branches (*Hadasim*), Willow branches (*Aravot*), and a Citron fruit (*Etrog*).
- **Gathering Supplies:** Purchase white table candles, clear glass hurricane lamps, heavy-duty outdoor patio string lights, water-soluble paper for kids' activities, and safe battery-operated LED lanterns.
- **Bulk Grocery Shopping:** Purchase dry pantry staples like honey, barley, long-grain wild rice, pomegranates, walnuts, and canned pumpkin/sweet potato puree.

SECTION 2: THE INITIAL NIGHTLY OPENING RITUALS

Perform these three actions every single night of the festival to set the atmosphere before transitioning into that night's specific biblical guest focus.

STEP 1: THE CANDLE LIGHTING SCRIPT

The mother or hostess strikes a match and kindles two white candles inside glass hurricane shields on the table, then gestures with her hands to bring the light inward.

- **The Proclamation:** "As we light these candles tonight, we remember the Great Illumination of Jerusalem during the Feast of Tabernacles. In days of old, massive golden lamps lit up the entire city to remind the people of the pillar of fire in the dark desert. We rejoice because that Light is no longer a shadow—it is a Person."
- **The Scripture Recitation:**

"Then spake Jesus again unto them, saying, I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." — John 8:12

- **The Blessing Prayer:** "Blessed art You, O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who hast given us life, sustained us, and brought us to this joyful season. We thank You for sending Your Son Jesus, the Light of the World, to tabernacle among us. Let His light chase away all darkness from our home. In Jesus' name, Amen."
-

STEP 2: THE FOUR SPECIES WAVE TRADITION

The leader holds the branch bundle in the right hand and the Citron fruit close to it in the left hand, facing East toward Jerusalem.

- **The Biblical History & Meaning:** In Leviticus 23:40, God commands His people to take branches of specific beautiful trees and rejoice before Him during Sukkot. In Jewish tradition, these four species represent different types of people or different parts of the human body (the straight palm represents the spine, the myrtle represents eyes, the willow represents lips, and the fragrant fruit represents a fruitful heart) unified in worship. From a Christian KJV perspective, shaking these branches in every direction serves as a physical declaration of praise, honoring Jesus Christ's total sovereignty and dominion over every corner of creation.
- **The Scripture Recitation:**

"O clap your hands, all ye people; shout unto God with the voice of triumph. For the LORD most high is terrible; he is a great King over all the earth." — **Psalm 47:1-2**

- **The Action:** Wave the bundle gently three times in each direction to declare Christ's total dominion: *Forward, Right, Backward, Left, Upward, and Downward.*
 - **The Family Shout:** The whole family shouts together: **"Hosanna! Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord!"**
-

STEP 3: THE CEREMONY OF LIVING WATER (*Nisuch HaMayim*)

Place a glass pitcher of water and an empty bowl in the center of the table. Give each child a small cup of water.

- **The Biblical History & Meaning:** In ancient Jerusalem, priests marched down to the Pool of Siloam every morning of Sukkot to draw living water in a golden flask. They processed through the Water Gate back to the Temple altar, pouring the water out as a visual prayer asking God to bless the winter agricultural rain. On the seventh day of the feast, as the water was poured, Jesus stood up and revealed Himself as the ultimate fulfillment of this shadow (John 7:37-38). *We reenact this pouring to celebrate that our spiritual thirst is quenched forever by the indwelling of His Holy Spirit.*
- **The Proclamation:** "During this feast, the priests poured out water on the Temple altar as a physical prayer for rain. On the very last day of this exact festival, Jesus stood up in the Temple court and revealed what that water truly meant!"
- **The Scripture Recitation:**

"In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, If any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink. He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water." — John 7:37-38

- **The Action:** The leader pours the pitcher steadily into the bowl from a high angle so everyone hears the splashing water. The children then pour their smaller cups into the central bowl together.
- **The Prayer:** "O Lord God, our souls thirst for You in a dry and weary land. We thank You for pouring out Your Holy Spirit upon us like floods upon dry ground. Let Your living water flow out from our lives to a world that is dying of thirst. Amen."

SECTION 3: THE CUSTOM OF THE NIGHTLY GUESTS (*THE USHPIZIN*)

- **The Meaning for the Christian Home:** Historically, families observing Sukkot symbolically "invite" seven great patriarchs of the scriptures into the Sukkah—one leading guest for each night. Every single one of these biblical figures was a wanderer, exile, or refugee who lived in temporary shelters and relied entirely on God's protection. By incorporating this custom into our Christian walk, we use these nightly guests as visual, historical links to teach our children the "Hall of Faith" found in Hebrews 11. Each patriarch points to a unique dynamic of faith, a distinct season of trials, and ultimately highlights how Jesus Christ is the ultimate fulfillment of every covenant promise.

Complete these steps before this step each night:

STEP 1: THE CANDLE LIGHTING SCRIPT (*NOTE the change under Day 8*)

STEP 2: THE FOUR SPECIES WAVE TRADITION

STEP 3: THE CEREMONY OF LIVING WATER (*Nisuch HaMayim*)

Night 1: Abraham — The father of faith who *"sojourned in the land of promise, as in a strange country, dwelling in tabernacles..."* (Hebrews 11:9).

Night 2: Isaac — The son of promise who sowed in the land during a famine and received a hundredfold harvest because the Lord blessed him (Genesis 26:12).

Night 3: Jacob — He fled his home with nothing but a staff, slept on a stone pillow, and experienced God's ladder connecting heaven and earth (Genesis 28:12).

Night 4: Joseph — Stripped of his coat, sold into exile, and imprisoned, yet God turned his suffering into a harvest of salvation for many (Genesis 50:20).

Night 5: Moses — He chose to suffer affliction with the people of God, led Israel into the wilderness, and oversaw the building of the original Tabernacle (Hebrews 11:25).

Night 6: Aaron — The First High Priest who wore the holy garments and interceded for the people, pointing directly to Christ, our Great High Priest (Hebrews 4:14).

Night 7: David — The shepherd king who danced before the Ark of God's presence and wrote, *"The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want"* (Psalm 23:1).

The Eighth Day (Shemini Atzeret): The Ultimate Host — On the eighth day, the focus shifts entirely away from earthly patriarchs to Jesus Christ, who hosts us forever in the New Jerusalem (Revelation 21:3)

Theme: The Shield of Faith & Faithful Sojourning

Evening Itinerary

- **5:30 PM – Finalize table setting; light the outdoor lanterns.**
- **6:00 PM – Gather the family inside the Sukkah; read the Host Opening Script.**
- **6:15 PM – Sound the Shofar; pray the Nightly Prayer.**
- **6:30 PM – Serve the Abrahamic Harvest Meal.**
- **7:15 PM – Kids' Craft Activity: *The Stars of Promise Banner*.**
- **7:45 PM – Sing *Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah*; clean up together**

KJV Scripture Focus: Hebrews 11:8-10

By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went.

By faith he sojourned in the land of promise, as in a strange country, dwelling in tabernacles with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promise:

For he looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God.

The Guest Script: "Tonight, we honor our first guest, Abraham—the father of our faith. Abraham left his comfortable home in Ur to live in temporary tents, trusting completely in God's voice. He didn't look at his earthly surroundings as permanent because he was looking forward to a heavenly city built by God. Let us learn to walk by faith, not by sight, this week."

The Nightly Prayer: "Heavenly Father, God of Abraham, give us the absolute faith to follow Your voice, even when we cannot see the path ahead. Thank You for being our shield and our exceeding great reward. Protect this tabernacle tonight, and help us to live as pilgrims looking toward our eternal home with You. Amen."

Kids' Craft: The Stars of Promise: Children cut out yellow paper stars. On each star, help them write one of God's promises (e.g., "I am with thee," "I will never leave thee"). Glue the stars onto a long blue ribbon or banner to hang across the Sukkah ceiling, remembering how God told Abraham his seed would outnumber the stars (Genesis 15:5).

Sample Harvest Menu

- Main: Slow-braised beef brisket with sweet caramelized onions.
 - Sides: Roasted zucchini, yellow squash, and rustic skillet cornbread.
- Dessert: Sliced fresh apples served with raw honey

Night 1 Recipe: Slow-Braised Abrahamic Brisket

Stuffed and rich dishes are traditional on Sukkot to symbolize a packed, overflowing harvest. .

Recipe:

Ingredients:

- 3.5 lb beef brisket,
- 3 large sweet onions (sliced),
- 4 garlic cloves (minced),
- 1 cup beef bone broth,
- 1/2 cup raw honey,
- 2 tbsp apple cider vinegar
- Spices: salt, black pepper, rosemary.

Instructions: Season brisket generously with salt, pepper, and rosemary. Sear both sides in a large pan until a brown crust forms. Place sliced onions and garlic at the bottom of a slow cooker. Lay the brisket over the onions. Whisk beef broth, raw honey, and apple cider vinegar together, then pour over the brisket. Cover and cook on low for 8 to 9 hours until the meat pulls apart easily with a fork. Slice against the grain and serve draped in the caramelized onion gravy.

Theme: The Sacrifice, Joy, and Hundredfold Blessing

Evening Itinerary

- 5:45 PM – Warm up the harvest stew; prepare the kids' coloring supplies.
- 6:10 PM – Gather in the Sukkah; read the Host Opening Script.
- 6:25 PM – Read the KJV Genesis passage together; pray the Nightly Prayer.
- 6:40 PM – Serve the Isaac-themed meal.
- 7:20 PM – Kids' Activity: *The "God Will Provide" Object Lesson*.
- 7:45 PM – Sing *O Come, All Ye Faithful*; twilight star-gazing.

KJV Scripture Focus

"And Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering, and laid it upon Isaac his son; and he took the fire in his hand, and a knife; and they went both of them together. And Isaac spake unto Abraham his father, and said, My father: and he said, Here am I, my son. And he said, Behold the fire and the wood: but where is the lamb for a burnt offering? And Abraham said, My son, God will provide himself a lamb for a burnt offering: so they went both of them together." — **Genesis 22:6-8**

Guest Script

"Tonight, on our second night of Sukkot, our guest is Isaac, the son of the promise. Isaac's name means 'laughter' or 'joy.' He represents absolute obedience, willingly laying his life down on the altar at Mount Moriah. Just as Isaac asked, 'Where is the lamb?', we rejoice tonight knowing that God has provided Himself a perfect Lamb in Jesus Christ!"

Nightly Prayer

"O Lord God, we praise You tonight because You are Jehovah-Jireh—the Lord who provides! Thank You for the perfect sacrifice of Your Son, Jesus, who was led like a lamb to the slaughter for our transgressions. We thank You for the joy of our salvation. Bless the labor of our hands this season, and let us reap a hundredfold harvest of righteousness for Your glory. Amen."

Children's Activity & Craft

- The Ram in the Thicket Cotton Craft: Draw a simple silhouette of a ram on cardstock. Have the children glue fluffy cotton balls inside the outline to give the ram its wool, then glue small real twigs or brown paper scraps around it to represent the thicket where God provided the substitute sacrifice.

Sample Harvest Menu

- Main: Hearty barley and lamb (or beef) stew representing the wilderness provision.
- Sides: Garlic-rubbed toasted pita pockets and creamy homemade hummus.
- Dessert: Warm cinnamon-baked pears.

Night 2 Recipe: Harvest Barley & Beef Stew

Ingredients:

- 1.5 lbs stew beef (cubed)
- 1 cup pearl barley (rinsed)
- 4 carrots (sliced)
- 3 stalks celery (chopped)
- 1 yellow onion (diced)
- 4 cups beef broth
- 1 can (14 oz) crushed tomatoes
- Spices: 1 tsp thyme, 2 bay leaves.

Instructions: In a large pot, brown the cubed stew beef in olive oil; remove and set aside. In the same pot, sauté the diced onions, carrots, and celery until soft. Return the beef to the pot, then add the rinsed pearl barley, beef broth, crushed tomatoes, thyme, and bay leaves. Bring to a rolling boil, then reduce heat to low. Cover tightly and simmer for 1.5 to 2 hours until the beef is meltingly tender and the barley has expanded into a rich, thick stew texture. Remove bay leaves before serving hot.

NIGHT 3: JACOB

Theme: The Ladder of Heaven & The Dwelling of Peace

Evening Itinerary

- **5:30 PM – Setup string lights; prep stuffed peppers.**
- **6:00 PM – Enter the Sukkah; Host Opening Script.**
- **6:15 PM – Read Scripture; pray the Nightly Prayer.**
- **6:30 PM – Serve dinner.**
- **7:15 PM – Kids' Craft: *The Popsicle Stick Ladder*.**
- **7:45 PM – Family Discussion: "How is Jesus our ladder to heaven?"**

KJV Scripture Focus

"And he dreamed, and behold a ladder set up on the earth, and the top of it reached to heaven: and behold the angels of God ascending and descending on it. And, behold, the LORD stood above it, and said, I am the LORD God of Abraham thy father, and the God of Isaac... and, behold, I am with thee, and will keep thee in all places whither thou goest..." — **Genesis 28:12-13, 15**

The Guest Script:

"Tonight, we welcome Jacob. Jacob spent much of his life fleeing from trouble, sleeping on the hard ground with a stone for a pillow. Yet, in that lonely place, God gave him a vision of a ladder connecting heaven and earth. Jesus told us in John 1:51 that He is that ladder! Through Him, we have peace and open access to the Father."

The Nightly Prayer:

"Dear Heavenly Father, we thank You that we are never alone or forsaken. As we look up through the branches of this Sukkah, we thank You for Jesus, who bridged the great gulf between earth and heaven. Keep us in all places whither we go, and give us Your sweet peace tonight. Amen."

Children's Activity & Craft

- Popsicle Stick Heaven-Ladder: Give children craft sticks and washable school glue. Have them glue two long sticks parallel, then glue smaller broken stick fragments horizontally to make the rungs of a ladder. They can paint it gold or add glitter to represent the glorious heavenly ladder.

Sample Harvest Menu

- Main: Harvest stuffed bell peppers packed with seasoned ground turkey and rice.
- Sides: Red lentil soup (remembering Jacob's pottage) and roasted garlic green beans.
- Dessert: Fresh pomegranate seeds.

Night 3 Recipe: Harvest-Stuffed Bell Peppers

Stuffed vegetables perfectly embody the "overflowing harvest" visual theme of the festival.

Ingredients:

- 6 large bell peppers (any color)
- 1 lb ground lean turkey or beef
- 1 cup cooked white rice
- 1 small onion (finely diced)
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 can (15 oz) tomato sauce
- Spices: 1 tsp Italian seasoning, garlic powder.

Instructions:

Cut off the tops of the bell peppers and clean out the seeds inside. In a skillet, cook the ground meat and diced onion together until fully browned; drain fat. Stir the cooked rice, half of the tomato sauce, the Italian seasoning, garlic powder, and half of the cheese into the meat mixture. Stuff this mixture tightly into the cavity of each pepper. Stand the peppers upright in a baking dish. Pour the remaining tomato sauce over the tops. Bake at 375°F covered in foil for 35 minutes. Uncover, top with the remaining cheese, and bake 5 minutes more until bubbling.

NIGHT 4: JOSEPH

Theme: From the Pit to the Harvest Palace

Evening Itinerary

- **5:45 PM – Plate the colorful fruits; assemble the main dishes.**
- **6:10 PM – Gather in the Sukkah; read the Host Opening Script.**
- **6:25 PM – Read the KJV Genesis passage; pray the Nightly Prayer.**
- **6:40 PM – Serve the Joseph Harvest Feast.**
- **7:15 PM – Kids' Activity: *The Coat of Many Colors Placemat*.**
- **7:45 PM – Sing *Blest Be the Tie That Binds*.**

KJV Scripture Focus

"But as for you, ye thought evil against me; but God meant it unto good, to bring to pass, as it is this day, to save much people alive. Now therefore fear ye not: I will nourish you, and your little ones. And he comforted them, and spake kindly unto them."

— **Genesis 50:20-21**

The Guest Script:

"Tonight, our fourth guest is Joseph. Joseph was betrayed by his brothers, stripped of his beautiful coat, thrown into a pit, and sold into Egyptian slavery. But God was with him! He was raised up to the highest palace to store up grain for a world-wide famine. Joseph reminds us that God turns our deepest trials into a harvest of salvation."

The Nightly Prayer:

"O Sovereign Lord, Thou art the master weaver of our lives. We thank Thee that no weapon formed against us shall prosper, and that all things work together for good to them that love Thee. When we face pits of trial, give us the patience of Joseph. Keep us kind and forgiving toward one another. Amen."

Children's Activity & Craft

- **The Coat of Many Colors Placemat:** Give children a blank piece of paper or cardboard. Let them glue strips of multi-colored construction paper, tissue paper, or ribbons across it in a beautiful striped pattern. Cover it with clear contact paper to use as a themed placemat for the rest of Sukkot.

Sample Harvest Menu

- Main: Honey-mustard glazed roasted chicken breasts (representing the abundance of Egypt).
- Sides: Sweet potato casserole and a vibrant mixed garden salad.
- Dessert: Assorted fruit platter with grapes, melons, and berries.

Night 4 Recipe: Honey-Glazed Palace Chicken & Sweet Potatoes

Ingredients:

- 6 bone-in chicken thighs
- 3 large sweet potatoes (peeled and cubed)
- 1/2 cup raw honey
- 1/4 cup dijon mustard
- 2 tbsp melted butter,
- Spices: 1 tsp paprika, salt, pepper.

Instructions:

Toss the cubed sweet potatoes in olive oil, salt, and pepper; spread them across the bottom of a large rimmed baking sheet. Arrange the chicken thighs on top of the potatoes. In a small bowl, whisk the honey, dijon mustard, melted butter, and paprika together. Brush this golden glaze generously over the chicken and sweet potatoes. Roast uncovered at 400°F for 40 to 45 minutes until the chicken skin is crispy and caramelized and the sweet potatoes are fork-tender.

NIGHT 5: MOSES

Theme: The Wilderness Tabernacle & Divine Guidance

Evening Itinerary

- **5:30 PM – Fire up the outdoor grill or slow cooker.**
- **6:00 PM – Gather the family; read the Host Opening Script.**
- **6:15 PM – Read Scripture; pray the Nightly Prayer.**
- **6:30 PM – Serve the Moses Wilderness Meal.**
- **7:15 PM – Kids' Activity: *The Pillar of Cloud & Fire Lantern*.**
- **7:45 PM – Sing *This Is the Day the Lord Hath Made*.**

KJV Scripture Focus

"And the LORD went before them by day in a pillar of a cloud, to lead them the way; and by night in a pillar of fire, to give them light; to go by day and night: He took not away the pillar of the cloud by day, nor the pillar of fire by night, from before the people."

— **Exodus 13:21-22**

The Guest Script:

"Tonight, our guest is Moses. Moses lived in a tent in the desert for forty years, leading millions of people through a barren wilderness. God gave Moses the exact pattern to build the Tabernacle so that the holy presence of God could live right in the center of the camp. Let us remember that God wants to be at the center of our lives today."

The Nightly Prayer:

"Almighty God, we praise You for Your constant guidance. Be our pillar of cloud by day to protect us from the heat of this world, and our pillar of fire by night to illuminate our path. Guide our family by Your Holy Word, and feed us daily with Your heavenly manna. Amen."

Children's Activity & Craft

- Pillar of Cloud and Fire Lantern: Take an empty, clean plastic water bottle or clear plastic cup. Have children glue white cotton balls around the top half (the cloud) and strips of red, orange, and yellow tissue paper around the bottom half (the fire). Place a safe battery-operated LED tealight inside to make it glow.

Sample Harvest Menu

- Main: Hearty grilled beef kabobs with onions and sweet bell peppers.
- Sides: Roasted root vegetables (carrots, parsnips, turnips) and flatbread wrappers.
- Dessert: Warm apple crisp with a scoop of vanilla cream.

Night 5 Recipe: Sinai Wilderness Kabobs

Ingredients:

- 1.5 lbs sirloin steak (cut into cubes),
- 2 red bell peppers (cut into chunks),
- *Marinate:* 1/4 cup olive oil, 3 tbsp soy sauce, 2 tbsp lemon juice, 2 minced garlic cloves.
- 1 large red onion (cut into chunks),
- 1 cup whole button mushrooms.

Instructions:

Whisk the marinade ingredients together in a zip-top bag, add the beef cubes, and marinate in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours. Thread the marinated beef cubes alternately with the pepper, onion, and mushroom chunks onto wooden or metal skewers. Fire up your outdoor grill to medium-high heat. Grill the kabobs for 8 to 11 minutes, turning occasionally, until the meat is cooked to your preference and the vegetables are charred beautifully at the edges.

NIGHT 6: AARON

Theme: The Intercession of the Great High Priest

Evening Itinerary

- **5:45 PM – Set out the fresh water pitchers and citrus slices.**
- **6:10 PM – Enter the Sukkah; read the Host Opening Script.**
- **6:25 PM – The Father pronounces Aaron's Blessing over the children; pray the Nightly Prayer.**
- **6:40 PM – Serve the Aaron-themed harvest meal.**
- **7:15 PM – Kids' Activity: *The "Living Water" Jar Assembly*.**
- **7:45 PM – Sing *Shall We Gather at the River?***

KJV Scripture Focus

"The LORD bless thee, and keep thee: The LORD make his face shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee: The LORD lift up his countenance upon thee, and give thee peace. And they shall put my name upon the children of Israel; and I will bless them." —

Numbers 6:24-27

The Guest Script:

"Tonight, our guest is Aaron, the first High Priest of Israel. Aaron's job was to stand before God's holy presence, burn sweet incense, and intercede for the people's sins. Aaron points directly to Jesus Christ, our ultimate Great High Priest, who lives forever to make intercession for us!"

The Nightly Prayer:

"Lord Jesus, our Great High Priest, we praise Thee that Thou hast entered into the true Heavenly Holy Place by Thine own blood! Let our family's prayers rise before Thy throne like sweet incense. Let Thy face shine upon our household tonight, and give us Thy deep, lasting peace. Amen."

Children's Activity & Craft

- "Living Water" Jar Filling: Give children a clean glass mason jar. Let them fill it with water and a few drops of blue food coloring (or clear water beads). Have them decorate the outside with stickers of fish or river stones, and tie a string tag around the rim featuring John 7:37 written out, reminding them of the living water Jesus promises.

Sample Harvest Menu

- Main: Lemon-herb baked or grilled fish fillets (representing the waters of life).
- Sides: Fluffy wild rice pilaf and steamed broccoli florets.
- Dessert: Zesty lemon bars or citrus fruit wedges.

Night 6 Recipe: Lemon-Herb High Priest Fish & Pilaf

Ingredients:

- 4 thick white fish fillets (Cod, Tilapia, or Mahi-Mahi),
- 2 lemons (sliced),
- 3 tbsp melted butter,
- Spices: 1 tsp dried dill weed, 1 tsp garlic powder, salt, pepper.

Instructions:

Place fish fillets in a greased glass baking dish. Pour melted butter over the fillets. Season evenly with dill weed, garlic powder, salt, and pepper. Lay fresh lemon slices over the top of each piece of fish. Bake uncovered at 400°F for 15 to 18 minutes until the fish flakes easily with a fork. Serve over a bed of steaming wild rice pilaf.

NIGHT 7: DAVID

Theme: The Shepherd King & The Tabernacle of Praise

Evening Itinerary

- **5:30 PM** – Prepare the Davidic celebration feast.
- **6:00 PM** – Gather in the Sukkah; read the Host Opening Script.
- **6:15 PM** – Read Psalm 23 responsively as a family; pray the Nightly Prayer.
- **6:30 PM** – Serve the King's Banquet.
- **7:15 PM** – Kids' Activity: *The Golden Diadem Crown Craft*.
- **7:45 PM** – Sing *All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name* with joyful clapping.

KJV Scripture Focus

"The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." — **Psalm 23:1-4**

The Guest Script:

"Tonight is Hoshana Rabbah—the Great Salvation! Our guest is King David. David started as a simple shepherd boy living out in the open fields protecting his sheep. He grew up to be a king who danced before God's presence with absolute joy. David reminds us that Jesus is the Good Shepherd and the coming King who will rule the earth!"

The Nightly Prayer:

"O Lord God, King of Kings, we praise Thee with joyful lips tonight! Thank Thee for being our Good Shepherd who leads us beside still waters and restores our souls. We rejoice in the promise of Thy coming Kingdom, when righteousness shall cover the earth. Fill our mouths with praise this night. Amen."

Children's Activity & Craft

- **The King's Diadem Crown:** Cut strips of gold cardstock to fit around the children's heads. Let them decorate their crowns with markers, metallic stickers, or colorful faux rhinestones. Staple the ends together so they can wear their royal crowns during the dinner feast.

Sample Harvest Menu

- **Main:** Slow-roasted beef brisket or pot roast with rich brown gravy.
- **Sides:** Garlic mashed potatoes and maple-glazed baby carrots.
- **Dessert:** Rich hot apple cider served with fresh gingerbread cookies.

Night 7 Recipe: Shepherd King's Pot Roast & Roots

Ingredients:

- 3 lb chuck roast,
- 4 large russet potatoes (peeled and quartered),
- 1 bag baby carrots,
- 2 cups beef broth,
- 1 packet dry onion soup mix,
- 2 tbsp olive oil.

Instructions:

Heat olive oil in a heavy Dutch oven over high heat. Sear all sides of the chuck roast until dark brown. Pour the beef broth over the meat and sprinkle the dry onion soup mix across the top. Cover tightly and bake at 325°F for 2 hours. Carefully remove from the oven and arrange the potato quarters and baby carrots all around the sides of the meat. Cover again and return to the oven for 1 more hour until both the roast and veggies are melt-in-your-mouth tender.

DAY & NIGHT 8: JESUS (THE ULTIMATE HOST)

Theme: Shemini Atzeret – The New Jerusalem & Eternal Dwelling

The Eighth Day is structurally separate from the seven days of Sukkot. The temporary Sukkah walls are no longer the primary focus; instead, we look forward to the permanent, perfect New Jerusalem where God houses us forever.

Day & Evening Itinerary

- **11:00 AM (Day) – Gather for a special holy convocation Bible reading of Revelation 21-22.**
- **12:30 PM – Enjoy a light family lunch of leftovers and fresh fruit.**
- **5:30 PM – Light all Sukkah lanterns to maximum brightness for the final night.**
- **6:00 PM – Read the Final Host Script.**
- **6:15 PM – Pray the Eternal Closing Prayer.**
- **6:30 PM – Serve the Ultimate New Jerusalem Celebration Feast.**
- **7:30 PM – Kids' Activity: *The Glow-in-the-Dark Scripture Lantern Walk*.**
- **8:15 PM – Sing *Jerusalem the Golden* together under the stars.**

THE EIGHTH DAY CEREMONY & LITURGY

1. The Light of the Lamb Proclamation

Instead of lighting two separate table candles, turn off every single overhead and ambient light in the Sukkah or dining area except for one single, blindingly bright white LED lantern or candle in the center of the table.

KJV Scripture Focus

"And I heard a great voice out of heaven saying, Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God. And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away." — **Revelation 21:3-4**

The Script:

"Today is the Eighth Day—Shemini Atzeret! The number eight in the Scriptures always signifies a brand-new beginning. Tonight, we do not look back to historical tents or past wilderness journeys. Tonight, Jesus Christ Himself is our Host. The temporary seven days of this present earth are passed away. This city we look toward needs no sun, neither moon, to shine in it; for the glory of God lightens it, and the Lamb is the light thereof!"

The Eternal Closing Prayer:

"Almighty and Everlasting God, You are the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End! We praise You for bringing our family safely through this holy season. We thank You for the glorious promise of the New Jerusalem. Thank You, Lord Jesus, for going ahead to prepare a permanent mansion for us in Your Father's house. Keep our hearts fixed on eternity, wipe away every tear from our eyes, and let Your light shine through us until You return in glory. In Your precious and holy name, Amen."

Children's Activity & Craft

- **Glow-in-the-Dark Lantern Walk:** Give each child an LED camping lantern or a flashlight. Turn off all the house and yard lights so the Sukkah is the only thing glowing. Walk around the perimeter of your yard or Sukkah together, reading out loud how the New City needs no sun or moon because Jesus is the light thereof (Revelation 21:23).

Sample Harvest Menu

- **Main:** Honey-glazed roasted turkey breast or festive baked ham.
- **Sides:** Southern-style cornbread dressing, cranberry sauce, and roasted sweet potatoes.
- **Dessert:** A sweet, deep-dish double-crust blackberry or apple cobbler served with vanilla bean ice cream.

The Eighth Day Recipe: Celebration Honey-Glazed Turkey & Deep-Dish Harvest Cobbler

The Meal: Roast a whole honey-glazed turkey breast served alongside cornbread dressing and homemade cranberry sauce to signify the great Wedding Supper of the Lamb.

The Dessert: Double-Crust Blackberry-Apple Cobbler

Ingredients:

- 3 cups sliced apples,
- 2 cups fresh blackberries,
- 3/4 cup sugar,
- 2 tbsp flour,
- 1 tsp cinnamon.

Crust:

- 2 sheets pre-made pie dough,
- 2 tbsp melted butter,
- coarse sugar.

*Instructions:**

Toss the apples, blackberries, sugar, flour, and cinnamon together in a bowl until coated. Pour the fruit mixture into a greased deep-dish baking pan. Cut one sheet of pie dough into strips and weave a lattice crust over the fruit, or place the sheet whole and cut large slits for steam. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with coarse sugar. Bake at 375°F for 45 to 50 minutes until the fruit juices bubble thick and the pastry turns a deep golden brown. Serve hot with vanilla bean ice cream.

Alternate themes for SUKKOT / THE FEAST OF TABERNACLES

Prophetic Theme: God Dwelling with Man, the Wedding Supper of the Lamb, and Great Joy.

KJV Scripture Focus

"Thou shalt observe the feast of tabernacles seven days, after that thou hast gathered in thy corn and thy wine: And thou shalt rejoice in thy feast, thou, and thy son, and thy daughter... because the LORD thy God shall bless thee in all thine increase, and in all the works of thine hands, therefore thou shalt surely rejoice." — **Leviticus 16:13-15**

"On the eighth day shall be an holy convocation unto you; and ye shall offer an offering made by fire unto the LORD: it is a solemn assembly; and ye shall do no servile work therein." — **Leviticus 23:36**

Sukkah Building, Decoration Ideas & Menu Plans

- **The Sukkah (Tabernacle):** A temporary outdoor structure with a roof made of natural materials (palm fronds, pine branches, corn stalks) through which you can see the stars. It can be built using a simple PVC pipe frame, an easy-to-assemble pop-up canopy frame with the canvas top removed, or a wooden frame.
 - **Decoration Ideas:**
 - Hanging string lights or solar-powered lanterns for evening meals.
 - Paper chains, drawings of biblical scenes, and natural foliage.
 - Printable or real fruit and vegetable hangings (corn, gourds, citrus, pomegranates).
 - **Master Menu Concept:** Celebrate with rich, abundant foods. Stuffed foods (like stuffed peppers or cabbage) are traditional to symbolize an overflowing, packed harvest. Serve hearty grilled meats, roasted root vegetables, warm apple cider, and fresh fruit cobblers.
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THE 8-DAY FAMILY DEVOTIONAL & THEMED NIGHT GUIDE

Gather in the Sukkah each evening around the dinner table. Light lanterns, read the KJV scriptures, pray the family prayer, and discuss the nightly theme.

NIGHT 1: The Wilderness Tabernacle (God's Presence Shelters Us)

- **Scripture:** "And let them make me a sanctuary; that I may dwell among them." — **Exodus 25:8**
- **The Theme:** We remember how God physically dwelt in the midst of Israel in the wilderness, providing cloud by day and fire by night.
- **Family Prayer:** "Heavenly Father, we thank Thee for Thy protective shelter. Just as Thou didst guide Israel through the barren desert, we thank Thee for guiding our family through this world. Be Thou our pillar of cloud and fire. Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** In what ways has God provided shelter and protection for our family this past year?

NIGHT 2: The Word Made Flesh (The First Coming)

- **Scripture:** "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt [tabernacled] among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth." — **John 1:14**
- **The Theme:** We celebrate Jesus leaving His heavenly throne to take on a temporary human body of flesh to dwell among men and save us.
- **Family Prayer:** "Lord Jesus, we praise Thee for Thy humility. Thou didst leave the riches of heaven to tabernacle in a fragile human body for our sakes. Thank Thee for coming to earth to save us. Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** Why is it important to remember that Jesus experienced the struggles of a temporary human life just like we do?

NIGHT 3: The Temple of the Holy Ghost (The Indwelling Presence)

- **Scripture:** "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own?" — **1 Corinthians 6:19**
- **The Theme:** We reflect on the marvel that God no longer dwells in buildings made of stone, but inside the hearts of those who trust in Christ.
- **Family Prayer:** "O Lord, clean our hearts and make them a holy habitation for Thy Spirit. Teach us to honor Thee with our bodies and minds, knowing that Thou art always dwelling within us. Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** How should our daily behavior change if we constantly remember that the Holy Spirit lives inside us?

NIGHT 4: Fellowship and Hospitality (Sharing the Harvest)

- **Scripture:** "Use hospitality one to another without grudging. As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." — **1 Peter 4:9-10**
- **The Theme:** Sukkot is a time of sharing our blessings. We focus on extending hospitality to brethren, neighbors, and the needy.
- **Family Prayer:** "Generous Father, Thou hast blessed us with an abundant harvest of grace. Open our hearts and our home to comfort others. Let our Sukkah be a place of refreshment for weary souls. Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** Who is someone we can bless or invite into our lives to show them the love and hospitality of Christ?

NIGHT 5: Joy in the Midst of Imperfection (The Temporary Life)

- **Scripture:** "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." — **2 Corinthians 5:1**
- **The Theme:** The Sukkah is fragile and temporary, reminding us that our earthly lives, trials, and material wealth are passing away. Our true joy is anchored in things eternal.
- **Family Prayer:** "Lord, help us not to love this world or the things in it. When our temporary earthly bodies grow weak, remind us of the glorious, eternal home Thou hast prepared for us in heaven. Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** How can we focus more on storing up treasures in heaven rather than spending our energy on temporary earthly things?

NIGHT 6: The Living Water (The Feast of Joy)

- **Scripture:** "In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, If any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink. He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water." — **John 7:37-38**
- **The Theme:** We remember Jesus crying out these words at the Temple during Sukkot. He is the ultimate fulfillment of our spiritual thirst.
- **Family Prayer:** "Lord Jesus, our souls thirst for Thee in a dry and weary land. Fill us overflowing with Thy living water so that Thy joy and truth may pour out of us to everyone we meet. Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** What does it mean to be spiritually thirsty, and how does Jesus completely satisfy that need?

NIGHT 7: Hoshana Rabbah (The Great Salvation & The Kingdom)

- **Scripture:** "And the LORD shall be king over all the earth: in that day shall there be one LORD, and his name one... And it shall come to pass, that every one that is left of all the nations... shall even go up from year to year to worship the King, the LORD of hosts, and to keep the feast of tabernacles." — **Zechariah 14:9, 16**
- **The Theme:** The final night of the core seven days points to the Millennial Reign of Christ, where all nations will gather to worship the King in Jerusalem.
- **Family Prayer:** "Even so, come, Lord Jesus! We look forward to Thy glorious kingdom, when righteousness shall fill the earth, and all nations shall bow before Thee. Thank Thee for making us part of Thy eternal kingdom. Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** What will the world look like when Jesus is physically reigning as King over the whole earth?

DAY & NIGHT 8: Shemini Atzeret (The Eighth Day - The New Beginnings)

- **Scripture:** "And I heard a great voice out of heaven saying, Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God. And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying..." — **Revelation 21:3-4**
- **The Theme:** The number eight signifies new beginnings. The Eighth Day is a distinct, separate holy convocation representing the New Jerusalem, the passing away of the old earth, and the eternal state where we dwell with God forever in absolute perfection.
- **Family Prayer:** "Almighty God, Thou art the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End! We praise Thee for the promise of the New Jerusalem, where death, sorrow, and pain shall be no more. Thank Thee for wiping away every tear. We commit our lives into Thy hands for all eternity. In the precious and holy name of Jesus Christ, Amen."
- **Discussion Prompt:** What are you most looking forward to about living in the New Jerusalem with God forever?

Children's Activities & Supply List

- **Craft: 8-Link Paper Chain of Promise**
 - **Activity:** Children cut out eight strips of colored construction paper. On each strip, help them write the theme of the night (e.g., Night 1: Wilderness, Night 2: Jesus, ..., Day 8: New Jerusalem). Loop them together to form a chain and hang it across the Sukkah ceiling.
 - *They can also make a similar chain with each link having something they are thankful for.*
- **Activity: Flashlight Scripture Walk**
 - **Activity: On the Eighth Day, turn off all the lights in the Sukkah except for one single bright lantern or flashlight representing the New City where "the Lamb is the light thereof" (Revelation 21:23). Read the final chapters of Revelation together in the glowing light.**
- **Supply List:**
 - Multi-colored construction paper (8 strips per child)
 - Non-toxic markers, crayons, and safety scissors
 - Tape or glue sticks
 - Heavy-duty outdoor flashlights or LED lanterns

SUKKOT GATHERING CHEAT SHEET

A quick reference guide for Christian families and friends celebrating the Feast of Tabernacles.

What is Sukkot?

"You shall rejoice before the Lord your God for seven days." — **Leviticus 23:40**

Sukkot (pronounced soo-KOAT) is a week-long biblical festival established by God in Leviticus 23. It is also known as the Feast of Tabernacles or the Festival of Booths. It serves a dual purpose as an autumn harvest celebration and a historical commemoration.

Core Biblical Themes

- **God's Provision & Shelter:** Commemorates the 40 years the Israelites lived in temporary shelters in the wilderness, entirely dependent on God for food, water, and guidance.
- **Harvest Gratitude:** A season of intense joy and thanksgiving for God's physical blessings and agricultural bounty over the past year.
- **Hospitality & Unity:** A commanded time of celebration meant to be shared generously with family, friends, and the community.

The Christian Connection (Christ in the Feast)

- **The Incarnation:** The word 'tabernacle' means to dwell. John 1:14 states that Jesus became flesh and 'tabernacled' (dwelt) among us.
- **The Living Water:** On the last great day of Sukkot, during the traditional water-drawing ceremony, Jesus stood up and proclaimed, 'If anyone thirsts, let him come to Me and drink... Out of his heart will flow rivers of living water' (John 7:37-38).
- **The Light of the World:** During the festival, massive golden candelabras lit up the entire temple courtyard. In this immediate context, Jesus declared, 'I am the light of the world. He who follows Me shall not walk in darkness' (John 8:12).

Key Traditions Explained

- **The Sukkah (The Booth):** A fragile, temporary outdoor structure with a roof made of natural materials (like branches or palm fronds) through which you can see the stars. Eating and fellowship inside it reminds us that our earthly lives are temporary, and our true security is in God.
- **The Four Species (Lulav & Etrog):** Based on Leviticus 23:40, four plants—palm, myrtle, willow branches, and a citron fruit—are gathered and waved in all directions, symbolizing God's omnipresence and the unity of different types of people.

Dinner Conversation Starters

1. 'Looking back at this past year, what is one specific way God provided for or protected you during a difficult moment?'
2. 'The sukkah is fragile and exposed to the elements. How does knowing our ultimate shelter is in Christ change how we handle daily stress?'
3. 'Jesus promised us "living water" during this very festival. In what areas of your life are you feeling spiritually thirsty right now?'
