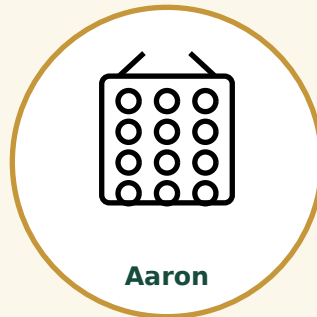
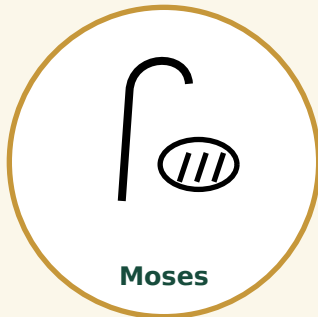
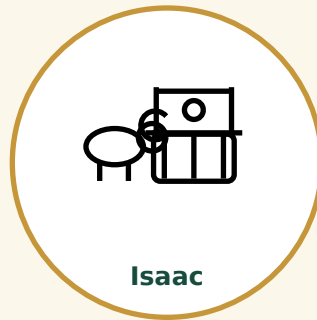


Seven Guests of Sukkot

Young Learners Coloring & Symbol Packet

How to Use This Packet

During the lesson

Let younger children color the matching guest page while the family reads and discusses that night's Bible passages.

Practice together

Read the short KJV verse aloud. Use the picture prompt for counting, observation, drawing, or a simple act of gratitude.

Prepare the basket

Color and cut apart the seven round tokens or the seven mini cards. Cardstock works best. Laminate or cover with clear contact paper if you want to reuse them.

Add one each night

Place the matching symbol in a small basket on the table. By the seventh night the basket will hold all seven reminders.

Keep the focus clear

The biblical people are remembered as examples in God's unfolding story. The custom of nightly guests is a later Jewish tradition, not a command to invite spirits. Christian families may use the symbols as visual reminders while worshiping God alone.

Suggested supplies

- crayons or colored pencils
- child-safe scissors
- cardstock
- small basket
- optional laminating sheets or clear contact paper

Safety note: an adult should cut and laminate pieces for children who need help with scissors.

Genesis 22:8 (KJV)

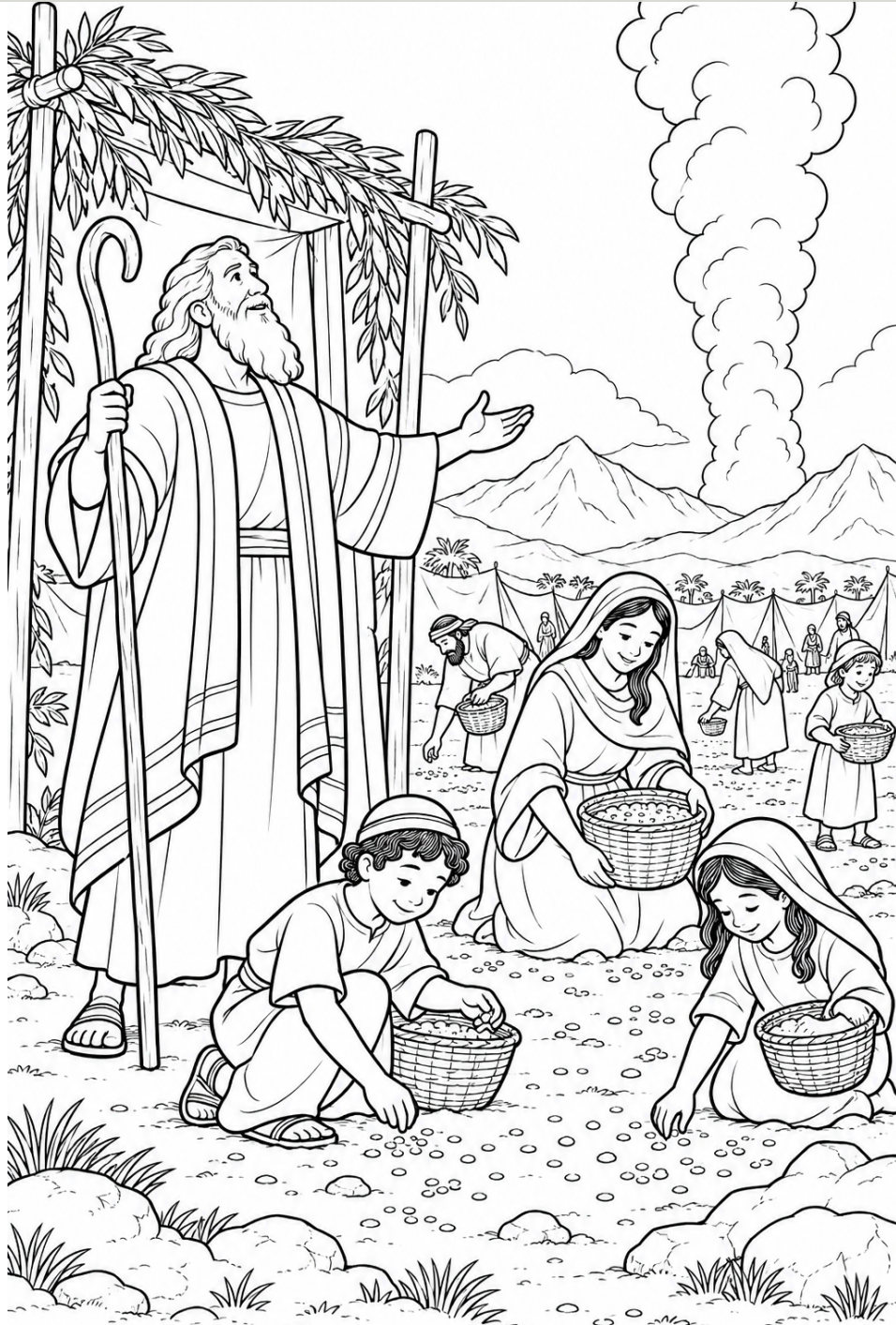
Circle the well and the ram. Thank God for water and daily provision.

Exodus 33:14 (KJV)

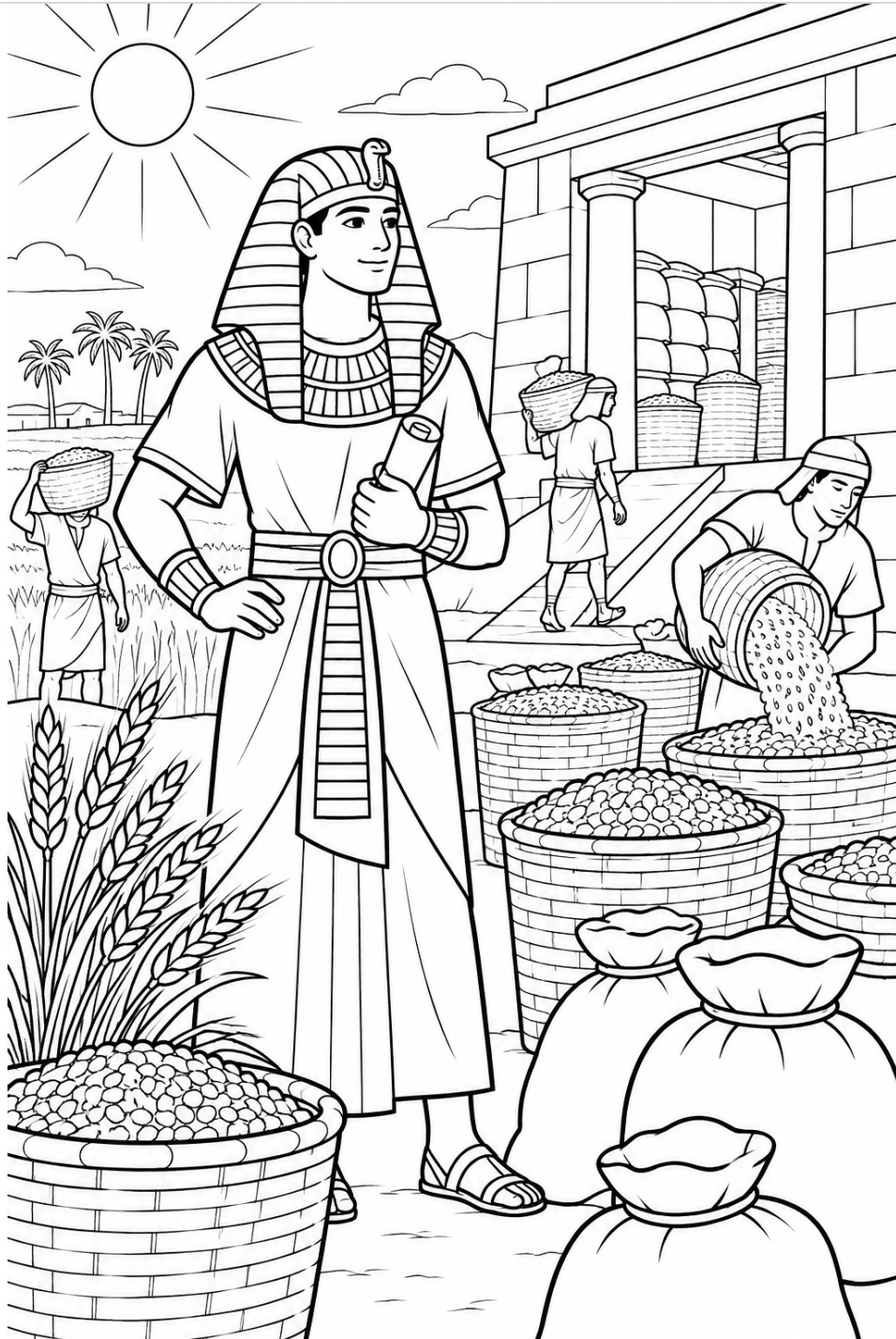
Find the booth, staff, baskets, and pillar of cloud. Count four baskets.

Find the wheat, grain baskets, sacks, and storehouse. Count seven containers.



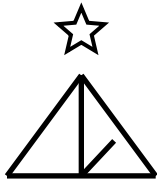
"The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want."

Count the sheep. Draw a music note near David's harp.

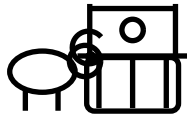
Color-and-Cut Basket Tokens
